BUILDING DOORS WILL BE LOCKED

As part of the District-wide security system and our emphasis on safety, the building doors will be locked during the day. Both of the main lobby entrance doors have a white box. Please push the button, wait for a response and you will be buzzed into the building. We may ask you to look toward the camera or identify yourself by speaking into the white box. Once you enter the building, please report directly to the office to sign in and pick up a visitor's badge. You will need to be buzzed in for you to enter the office. Please push the door once you hear the buzz noise.

Visitors to the Schools – to maintain a safe place for our children to work and learn, certain limits must be set for visits by parents and other agencies. For these reasons, the following rules apply to ALL visitors to the school:

Access to the elementary building will be through the main entrance ONLY beginning at 7:35 AM.

ALL VISITORS ARE REQUIRED TO SIGN IN AT THE MAIN OFFICE IMMEDIATELY UPON ENTERING THE BUILDING TO RECEIVE A VISITOR'S PASS WHICH MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES WHILE IN THE SCHOOL OR ON THE SCHOOL GROUNDS.

Also, as parents arrive in the morning with children, please remain in your vehicles. Children must learn to proceed to their room on their own.

Teachers are expected NOT to take class time to discuss individual matters with visitors.

Visitors attending school functions that are open to the public such as parent teacher organization (PTO) meetings or public gatherings are not required to register.

Any consumables (food, beverages, etc.) brought in by visitors are subject to search and / or inspection.

GUIDELINES FOR CLASSROOM PARTIES / CELEBRATIONS

Following the below practices will help to protect your children against food-borne illness. If bringing food to your child's class such as drinks, cakes or pastries, the following guidelines should be used:

Please notify the teacher and get their permission first. Immediately after cooking, if possible, items should be wrapped individually (i.e. cookies, muffins, cupcakes, etc.). The Chemung County Health department makes these additional requests:

COLD FOODS SHOULD BE REFRIGERATED IMMEDIATLEY AND HELD BELOW 45 DEGREES FAHRENHEIT. HANDS SHOULD BE WASHED BEFORE FOOD PREP AND THEN YOU SHOULD NOT TOUCH FOODS AFTER THEY ARE COOKED. GLOVES, TONGS OR DELI PAPER SHOULD BE USED SO THERE IS NO BAREHANDED CONTACT WITH FOOD AFTER PREPARATION.

*TEACHERS DO NOT HAVE KNIVES OR UTENSILS IN THE CLASSROOM-SO PLEASE MAKE SURE ALL TREATS

ARE PRE-CUT OR INDIVIDUALLY WRAPPED.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL - If a student needs any form of medication at school, a written physician's prescription and written parental consent are necessary. Any medication should be brought in the original container to the health office by an adult where it will be stored and dispensed. Please contact Mrs. Strong with further questions, please call the office at 795-2580.

<u>APPR of Teacher and Principals</u> - The District is required to implement Annual Professional Performance Reviews (APPR) of teachers and principals. The outcome of the APPR is that each teacher and principal will receive an Overall Composite Rating based upon Observation and Student Performance scores. The four possible Overall Composite Ratings are Highly Effective, Effective, Developing and Ineffective (HEDI). You may request the Overall Composite Rating for the teachers and principals in the school building to which your child is assigned for the current school year by contacting the building principal of your child's school. Further, if you require additional explanation of the ratings for the teachers and principals, you may contact Tony Gill, Assistant Superintendent, at 607-739-5601, x4263. Please note that this information may be released only to parents or legal guardians. The District will verify that any request received is a bona fide request submitted by a parent or legal guardian.

- Participate fully in any school activities, including before- or after-school activities

Get support services and help with things like school supplies through Title I

Ge free school meals without filling out an application

Get help enrolling in pre-k, Head Start, other preschool programs, and Early Intervention

Get help applying for financial aid for college if the student is an unaccompanied youth

<u>Center Street Elementary: Kindergarten - 4th 2023 - 2024</u> <u>Student Drop-Off: 7:35 AM - 8:15 AM</u>

Follow markings on map attached for direction of travel in the parking lot. ALL vehicles must drop their students off in the drop off-line.

Students may begin to eat breakfast at 7:35.

Seven vehicles should be prepared to unload at one time.

All students enter the LOBBY entrance doors.

Students will then be directed into the cafeteria.

Parents should not park at this time and get out of their car. We will provide our students car to door service.

If you arrive later <u>past 8:15</u>, please pull up in front of the building closest to the sidewalk, and walk your child to the lobby; ring the bell on the box outside of the doors. Someone will come out to assist you.

<u>Student Pick-Up: 2:25 PM – 2:40 PM – you may line up beginning at 2:15.</u> Please follow the directions on the map.

On the map, please follow the color representing your child's grade level.

If our traffic is backed up entering the parking lot, kindly turn right when entering the parking lot and do a U-Turn in front of the high school. You will then be able to proceed to the correct line. This will assist with keeping our traffic moving.

Kindergarten Parents will need to start lining up at 2:05 – Past the flagpole.

Please place your provided pick-up name sign on the <u>passenger's side of your</u> <u>vehicle</u> either on the dashboard or on the window. This will help to expedite the dismissal process. Every child will receive a sign and the **oldest sibling** will receive a Family Sign should you have more than one child attending CS. Please wait in your vehicle until:

All busses have departed AND it is **2:30** or unless directed by a CS Staff Member. Staff will be looking for your sign and then will bring your child to you.

- If it is a unique day and you are picking up <u>multiple students outside of your</u> <u>household</u>, you will need to go back around to the appropriate line to pick up the additional students by grade.
- If you arrive <u>earlier than 1:50</u> to pick up your child for an appointment, please pull up in front of the building closest to the sidewalk, ring the bell on the box located outside of the doors and someone will come out to assist you.
- Parents should not park and get out of their car only if outside of school dismissal times. All of our BOCES classes, please follow the kindergarten drop off and

Families may arrive on campus at 8:55 and our staff will meet you at your car. Please pull up parallel to our sidewalk nearest the school. We provide door to door service for your child! Parents, please do not park and get out of your car <u>with the</u> <u>exception of the first day of school, Sept. 5th. You may</u> <u>park and escort your child to his/her Pre-K classroom</u> <u>using the front lobby doors on Tuesday, Sept. 5th.</u> All other days, there will be staff members available to assist your child.

<u>Student Pick-Up: 1:55 PM – 2:00 PM</u>

Families may arrive on campus at 1:55. Again, we provide door to door service for your child! Our staff will be bringing out your child to your car. Please remain in your car. Please put your car sign on the dashboard on the passenger's side and / or on the window of the passenger's side. As the staff member brings your child to you, be prepared to sign out your child and show ID the first week of school.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM OUR SCHOOL NURSE

When to keep your student home

Please keep your child home IF/ Can return WHEN: Fever of 100.4 or higher: Fever free without medication for 24 hours
2. Diarrhea within 24 hours: Free from diarrhea for 24 hours Vomiting within 24 hours: Free from vomiting for 24 hours Rash or open sores on the skin: Free from rash or with a providers note to return to school Severe ear pain or ear drainage: When evaluated and released by a health care provider Tested positive for strep throat: Until treated with antibiotics for 12 hours Tested positive for Covid 19: Call school nurse for most up to date quarantine requirements Severe pain that is not improving such as headache or stomach pains: When improved or evaluated by a health care provider
Any illness causing the student to be too sleepy (lethargic) or ill to participate in class: When they have recovered from illness
Significant disruptive cough or trouble breathing: When symptoms have improved

Hospital stays, ER visit, significant injury, or surgery: With a note from a medical provider to return to school Any condition that you think may be serious or contagious to others: Check with your healthcare provider

Please call your school nurse if you have questions on if your child should stay home sick and when to return.

Medication

A provider order is required for the nurse to administer any medications at school. This is necessary for both prescription and nonprescription (over the counter) medications. Over the counter medications include medication such as Tylenol, Ibuprofen, cough drops, cold medications, essential oils etc. If your child requires medication during the school day we require:

A provider order that is also signed by the parent/guardian.

The parent/guardian is responsible to have the medication delivered directly to the school nurse by an adult. **Medication cannot be sent in with children**.

Medication must be in a properly labeled original pharmacy container. Over the counter medications must be in their original packaging and match the provider order.

*For students to independently carry/administer medication they require healthcare provider order authorizing them to self-carry and self-administer their medications and written parent/guardian consent

Medication orders must be renewed annually. At the end of the year medications at school must be picked up by an adult or they will be disposed of after the last day of school.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM OUR SCHOOL NURSE

Immunizations

New York State Public Health Law 2164 requires every student entering or attending school in New York State to be vaccinated in accordance with Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommendations. Public Health Law Section 2164 provides only for medical exemptions to immunization. Acceptable forms of proof of immunization (documentation) include:

An electronic health record from your providers office, an immunization certificate signed of stamped by your health care provider, a record issued by NYSIIS or CIR, an official immunization registry from another state or foreign country if applicable.

You will be notified if your student is missing any immunizations. Your student will not be allowed to attend school per NYS law if proof of immunization is not received. Physicals

New York State requires that all students must have a physical exam when they enter grades pre-kindergarten/ kindergarten, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11. Physicals are also required for all athletes, working papers, and new students entering the district. Physicals must be done by a New York state provider and documented on the required New York state health examination form.

Physicals completed within the 12-month period preceding the start of the school year are acceptable. The physical must be submitted within 30 days of your student entering school. If we do not receive the physical, they will be scheduled for a school appraisal by the district nurse practitioner.


Please note: An appraisal is not the same as a full physical by your private physician. School appraisals are intended for school attendance only and are not intended to replace the continuity of care provided by your private physician. School appraisals do not provide service orders (OT, PT, speech, etc) or medication orders. The state requires all schools to request dental health certificates from parents at the same time we require a health certificate (grades Pre-K, K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11). For more information, contact your school nurse. **Screenings**

All students are screened according to state mandates. If the results of any screening indicate that the child requires further follow-up, the parent/guardian will receive written notification to follow up with an outside provider:

Vision in grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 11, and new students Hearing in grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 11, and new students Scoliosis: Girls - grades 5, 7; Boys - grade 9

When filling out the application form, please pay careful attention to these helpful hints.

SNAP/TANF/FDPIR case number: This must be the <u>complete</u> valid case number supplied to you by the agency including all numbers <u>and</u> letters, for example, E123456, or whatever combination is used in your county. Refer to a letter you received from your local Department of Social Services for your case number or contact them for your number.

Foster Child: A child who is living with a family but who is under the legal care of the welfare agency or court may be listed on your family application. List the child's "personal use" income. This includes only those funds provided by the agency which are identified for the <u>personal</u> use of the child, such as personal spending allowances, money received by his/her family, or from a job. Funds provided for housing, food and care, medical, and therapeutic needs are <u>not</u> considered income to the foster child. Write "0" if the child has no personal use income.

Household: A group of related or non-related people who are living in one house and share income and expenses.

Adult Family Members: All related and non-related people who are 21 years of age and older living in your house.

Financially Independent: A person is financially independent and a separate economic unit/household when his or her earnings and expenses are not shared by the family/household. Separate economic units in the same residence are characterized by prorating expenses and by economic independence from one another.

Current Gross Income: Money earned or received at the present time by each member of your household <u>before deductions</u>. Examples of deductions are federal tax, State tax, and Social Security deductions. If you have more than one job, you must list the income from all jobs. If you receive income from more than one source (wage, alimony, child support, etc.), you must list the income from all sources. Only farmers, self-employed workers, migrant workers, and other seasonal employees may use their income for the past 12 months reported from their 1040 Tax Forms.

Examples of gross income are:

- Wages, salaries, tips, commissions, or income from self-employment
- Net farm income gross sales minus expenses only not losses
- Pensions, annuities, or other retirement income including Social Security retirement benefits
- · Unemployment compensation
- Welfare payments (does not include value of SNAP)
- · Public Assistance payments
- Adoption assistance

- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Survivor's Benefits
- Alimony or child support payments
- · Disability benefits, including workman's compensation
- · Veteran's subsistence benefits
- Interest or dividend income
- Cash withdrawn from savings, investments, trusts, and other resources which would be available to pay for a child's meals
- · Other cash income

Income Exclusions: The value of any child care provided or arranged, or any amount received as payment for such child care or reimbursement for costs incurred for such care under the Child Care Development (Block Grant) Fund should not be considered as income for this program.

NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS UNDER THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT

Dear Parent/Guardian or Eligible Student:

This is to advise you of your rights with respect to student records pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). FERPA is a federal law designed to protect the privacy of student records. The law gives parents/guardians and students over 18 years of age (referred to in the law as "eligible students") the following rights:

1. The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the district receives a request for access.

Parents/guardians or eligible students should submit to the Building Principal a written request that identifies the records they wish to inspect. The Principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent/guardian or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent/guardian or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading.

Parents/guardians or eligible students may ask the district to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading by writing the Principal, clearly identifying the part of the record they want changed, and specifying why it is inaccurate or misleading.

If the district decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent/guardian or eligible student, the district will notify the parent/guardian or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent/guardian or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

Upon request, the district discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.

Horseheads Central School District Parents' Bill of Rights Relating to Student Data

The Horseheads Central School District, in compliance with Education Law 2-d, hereby establishes the following Parents' Bill of Rights in regard to student data:

1. A student's personally identifiable information will not be sold or released for any commercial purpose;

2. Parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's educational record. Procedures for reviewing student records can be found in the Board Policy entitled "Student Records," Policy 5500, Regulation 5500-R;

3. Security protocols regarding confidentiality of personally identifiable information are currently in place and the safeguards necessary to protect the confidentiality of student data are maintained at industry standards and best practices. The safeguards include but are not limited to encryption, firewalls, and password protection.

4. New York State maintains a complete list of all student data collected by the State and the data is available for public review at <u>www.nysed.gov</u>, or by writing to 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, NY 12234.

5. Parents have the right to have complaints about possible breaches of student data addressed. Complaints should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, One Raider Lane, Horseheads, NY 14845.

The Center Street students are dismissed at 2:25 p.m. In order to ensure the safety of our children the following procedures must be followed:

Dismissal Plans: Parents must supply the school office with written notification of their child's regular dismissal plans by the first day of school. If you have more than one child, please write a note for each child's teacher.

Walkers: Children who walk home must have a note to inform the teacher. If your child is to walk home on a daily basis, please send one note at the beginning of the year indicating this plan stating "until further notice". If your child will walk home only on special occasions, you will need to send a note each time.

Parent Pick-ups: Children who will be picked up on a daily basis must have a note from parents at the beginning of the school year indicating this plan stating "until further notice". Any student that will be picked up from school, on special occasions or early for an appointment, must have a note for each time.

Dismissal Changes: Parents must call the office by 10:00am,due to the Transportation Department notifications, with any dismissal changes for student pick-up. *For any dismissal changes after 10:00 am, only emergency changes will be honored .*

After School Kids World: Children, who have registered for the programs in advance, attending the Kids World Program at Center Street must have a note on file in the school office from parents by the start of school. Also, any parent or guardian picking up a child from school must come into the cafeteria to sign-out the child. Students will not be sent outside to meet a parent nor will they be released directly from the classroom, teacher or lobby area. Thanks for your cooperation in keeping our students safe.

Horseheads Central School District Information about Emergency School Closings/Delays

Schools are closed when the weather makes it impossible to have reasonable attendance or when the schools or vehicles would not be able to operate safely. The school day is delayed when inclement weather conditions improve by early morning. Inclement weather may include snow, ice, and freezing temperatures.
