FRIENDLY REMINDERS:

• Delayed Start Procedures

As we enter the winter months, please be advised that the Horseheads Central School District uses a delayed start procedure in addition to school closings. The delay opens schools **two hours*** later than normal start time. School ends at the regular time on delayed start days. Morning buses will arrive at the bus stops two hours later; staff will arrive two hours later; and students being dropped off at school in the morning should arrive two hours later. Breakfast will not be served on delayed start days. The announcements can be found on our Facebook page, on our District website www.horseheadsdistrict.com, or on the local media stations. Radio and television stations that will be announcing the delayed starts and/or school closings are listed on page 5 of the District Calendar. *Pre-K classes will begin at 10:30am when there is a delayed start.

Recess

Students continue to go outside for recess during winter months. Please be sure that your child has a warm coat, hat, gloves/mittens, and boots so they can stay warm as they play. *Please remember that the nurse cannot provide boots for any student.

• Changes in Going Home Routine/Bus Notes
Please remember to write a 'blue note' with
your child's change in dismissal plans if he/she will
not be following their normal routine. Blue notes
should also be written to explain your child's
tardiness, absence, or plan to leave early. This is
extremely important for the safety of our students.

School and Emergency Closings

School closings due to inclement weather will be announced via various media outlets such as WNKI, WPGI, Magic FM, and WELM radio stations, and WENY, WETM, and Time Warner Cable News on TV. In the event of an emergency during the school day, all students will be taken by bus to the address previously identified by parents on the "Emergency Go Home" form that was completed at the beginning of the school year. As a reminder, this location MUST be on one of the Big Flats Elementary bus routes.

Snow Days Impact our Schedule
When a snow day occurs and all schools
in the District are closed, it changes our
six-day schedule. The next day that
school is in session is the cycle day that
the snow day would have been.

Parents' Bill of Rights Relating to Student Data

The Horseheads Central School District, in compliance with Education Law 2-d, hereby establishes the following Parents' Bill of Rights in regard to student data:

- 1. A student's personally identifiable information will not be sold or released for any commercial purpose;
- 2. Parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's educational record. Procedures for reviewing student records can be found in the Board Policy entitled 'Student Records,' Policy 5500, Regulation 5500-R;
- 3. Security protocols regarding confidentiality of personally identifiable information are currently in place and the safeguards necessary to protect the confidentiality of student data are maintained at industry standards and best practices. The safeguards include but are not limited to: encryptions, firewalls, and password protection.
- 4. New York State maintains a complete list of all student data collected by the State and the data is available for public review at www.nysed.gov, or by writing to: 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, NY 12234.
- 5. Parents have the right to have complaints about possible breaches of student data addressed. Complaints should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, One Raider Lane, Horseheads, NY 14845.

ATTENTION PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF 3RD AND 4TH GRADERS

To provide schools and parents with an assessment of student achievement, New York State has developed the New York State Testing Program. These standardized tests challenge all students in grades 3 through 8 to demonstrate their knowledge and skills in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. A SIMPLE SECURITY BEST PRACTICE

If you need to walk away from your computer for a short while, it is a best practice to lock your screen so that no one can access your programs without your knowledge.

On Windows: (3 options)

- Hit the Windows key and the L key on your keyboard.
- Press Ctrl-Alt-Delete. On the menu that pops up, click Lock.
- Click the Start button in the bottom-left corner. Click your user icon and then select Lock.

On Macintosh: (2 options)

- Click on the apple in the top left corner. Choose Lock Screen.
- 2. Use the keyboard shortcut command + control + Q.

AdChoices



If you see this symbol or the words "Ad Choices", it indicates that the advertising is "Interest-based advertising", also known as "online behavioral advertising", or "behavioral targeting". This means that the site selectively displays ads based on your browsing history to display ads that you are most likely to identify with and respond to the ad's specific content.

The AdChoices icon is shown automatically by companies as part of the self-regulatory program, and is meant to indicate to consumers when interest-based advertising data is being collected or used. By clicking on the icon, a consumer can learn more about the ad or a website's collection practices, and be provided with the ability to opt-out of such targeting.

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DIGITAL LAW and STUDENT DATA PRIVACY

The information in this section is excerpted from <u>The Educator's Guide to Student Data Privacy</u>, created by **ConnectSafely.org** and **The Future of Privacy Forum**

LAWS THAT PARENTS & EDUCATORS SHOULD KNOW		
Acronym or Abbreviation	Full Title	What it says
FERPA	Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act	This federal law that guarantees that parents have access to their child's education record and restricts who can access and use student information.
СОРРА	The Children's Online Privacy Protection Act	This law controls what information is collected from young children by companies operating websites, games, and mobile applications directed toward children under 13.
CIPA	The Children's Internet Protection Act	This law requires that K–12 schools and libraries in the United States use Internet filters and implement other measures to protect children from harmful online content as a condition for federal funding.
NYS 2-d	New York State Education Law 2-d	This law states that a student's personally identifiable information cannot be sold or released for any commercial purposes, and that parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's education record. Other restrictions exist on the transfer and storage of student data.

Some Frequently Asked Questions about Student Data?

- Why should classroom teachers care about student data privacy?
 There are legal and ethical restrictions that impact districts, schools, and teachers.
- What constitutes student data?
 Information that is tied to individual students is referred to as personally identifiable information, or PII, and is subject to additional restrictions in laws and regulations.
- 3. Does my district have a list of approved online software programs that can be used in my class?

 Check with your district's technology department to see if they have a list of "safe" software. Many online software sites require you to set up accounts for your students that may use personally identifiable information. It is important for these sites to be vetted ensuring that they meet the requirements of privacy laws.
- 4. What if I want to use an education app or tool and I don't know if my school/district has vetted it?
 Be familiar with your school's policy or process for selecting new educational tools, if one exists.

CARING FOR YOUR ONE-to-ONE DEVICE

If you are lucky enough that your school has a one-to-one program that provides a device for your use, it is important to understand that it is your responsibility to care for the device to keep it in top form.

Your district may have specific policies that defines how you can protect and care for your device but here are some good general tips for you.

- Follow your school/district rules for using your device.
- Make sure to charge your device according to the device's instructions so that it is ready when you need it.
- Take special care of your device's screen.
 Screens are sensitive and may scratch or crack if not cared for.
- If your device has a lid or a cover make sure to close it or cover it before moving it to another location.
- 5. If your device is placed in a backpack, make sure that there are no objects in the backpack that may damage the device. Also, don't throw your backpack around with the device in it.
- Avoid placing heavy objects on the device, and be careful not to sit or lean on it device as pressure can bend and damage the device.
- Try to use your device on a clean, level area like a table or desk so that it won't bang into things or fall, or be dropped.
- Do not have food or drinks near your device as liquids can cause problems with the device.
- Do not leave your device in a car, outside, or in an unsupervised area. Extremes of temperature or weather can effect your device. Devices may be stolen if they are left unattended.

As already mentioned, it is important to know your school's rules and policies. Some schools require parents to pay for repairs that are not considered normal wear and tear for a device.

BEWARE OF NINTENDO SWITCH HACKING AND PIRACY!

Hackers have had success in gaining access to parts of Nintendo's infrastructure that is usually closed-off from ordinary Switch users. This includes servers used internally by Nintendo, such as one which hosts different versions of the Switch operating system.

Pirates deploy malware to steal each other's files so they can download more games themselves. Groups deliberately plant code into others' Switches so they are 'bricked' and no longer work properly.
