As part of the District-wide security system and our emphasis on safety, the building doors will be locked during the day. Both of the main lobby entrance doors have a white box. Please push the button, wait for a response and you will be buzzed into the building. We may ask you to look toward the camera or identify yourself by speaking into the white box. Once you enter the building, please report directly to the office to sign in and pick up a visitor's badge.

Visitors to the Schools – to maintain a safe place for our children to work and learn, certain limits must be set for visits by parents and other agencies. For these reasons, the following rules apply to ALL visitors to the school.

Access to the elementary building will be through the <u>main entrance ONLY</u>. This entrance will be open for students and visitors from 7:45 - 2:25 PM.

ALL VISITORS ARE REQUIRED TO SIGN IN AT THE MAIN OFFICE IMMEDIATELY UPON ENTERING THE BUILDING TO RECEIVE A VISITOR'S PASS WHICH MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES WHILE IN THE SCHOOL OR ON THE SCHOOL GROUNDS.

Also, as parents arrive in the morning with children, please remain in the lobby area, children must learn to proceed to the room on their own.

Teachers are expected NOT to take class time to discuss individual matters with visitors.

Visitors attending school functions that are open to the public such as parent teacher organization (PTO) meetings or public gatherings are not required to register.

Any consumables (food, beverages, etc.) brought in by visitors are subject to search and / or inspection.

Please note these district rules are approved by the Horseheads Board of Education. These safety procedures need your support. If you have any questions regarding these procedures, please call the office. Thank you in advance for your help and support with keeping safety a priority

GUIDELINES FOR CLASSROOM PARTIES / CELEBRATIONS

If bringing food to your child's class such as drinks, cakes or pastries, the following guidelines should be used:

- Please notify the teacher and get their permission first.
- Immediately after cooking, if possible, items should be wrapped individually (i.e. cookies, muffins, cupcakes, etc.).
- The Chemung County Health department makes these additional requests: COLD FOODS SHOULD BE REFRIGERATED IMMEDIATLEY AND HELD BELOW 45 DEGREES FAHRENHEIT.
 HANDS SHOULD BE WASHED BEFORE FOOD PREP AND THEN YOU SHOULD NOT TOUCH FOODS AFTER THEY ARE COOKED.
 GLOVES, TONGS OR DELI PAPER SHOULD BE USED SO THERE IS NO BAREHANDED CONTACT WITH FOOD AFTER PREPARATION. Following the above practices will help to protect your children against food-borne illness.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL - If a student needs any form of medication at school, a written physician's prescription and written parental consent are necessary. Any medication should be brought in the original container to the health office where it will be stored and dispensed. Please contact Mrs. White with further questions.

MARCH PROJECT FAIR COMING SOONI THURS., MARCH 3rd

GRADE PRE K – "RAINBOWS"

Individually students will create a rainbow. Students will use paints and paper. Students will create the project at school. Students will identify the different colors in a rainbow.

GRADE K – "FARM ANIMALS" NEED K TEAM INPUT!

Students will create a farm or zoo at home. Students may use a variety of materials to demonstrate their knowledge of the types of animals that live on a farm.

GRADE 1 – "SOUND AND RECYCLING"

Students will create a project to display how vibration creates sounds. Students will use any recycled materials or and household items. Students will complete the project at home. Students must include at least one sentence they wrote to describe what creates the sound.

GRADE 2 – "INSECTS"

Second graders will work independently or with the assistance of family members at home to choose an insect and create it. This can be done in different ways. Your child can make a model, a poster, a diorama, a book – the possibilities are endless. Crayons, markers, paint, magazine pictures, or any craft supplies can be used. The insect projects must include the name of the insect. The three main body parts (head, thorax, and abdomen) must be labeled. Non-fiction books about insects can be used to give your child ideas. The internet can also be a great resource when used with adult supervision.

GRADE 3 – "FAST CHANGES ON LAND"

Independently, third graders will construct an exhibit or to illustrate a fast change on land. Research choices include volcano, earthquake, landslide, hurricane, tornado or avalanche. Students must include name of the fast change and label objects on the project. Students must include detailed sentences of possible destruction to the land.

GRADE 4 – "New York State Animal Project"

Students will demonstrate their knowledge of their selected New York State animal. Independently, students will research and create an exhibit teaching others about their chosen animal. Students will construct a display focusing on a model of the physical characteristics of their animal and/or its habitat. Students will be able to use any variety of materials they have available to create their exhibit.

News from the Health Office:

What Everyone Should Know about Flu and the Flu Vaccine: The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. Some people, such as older people, young children, and people with certain health conditions, are at high risk for serious flu complications. The best way to prevent this illness is by getting a flu vaccination.

What are the symptoms of the flu: •Fever* or feeling feverish/chills, •Cough, •Sore throat, •Runny or stuffy nose, •Muscle or body aches, •Headaches, •Fatigue (tiredness), •some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults,* It's Important to note that not everyone with flu will have a fever.

How is the flu spread? The flu is spread in droplets released by coughing and sneezing. It usually spreads from person to person, though occasionally people may be infected by touching something with the virus on it and then touching their mouth or nose. Good hand washing, covering your mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing are very important!

When and for how long is a person able to spread the flu? People with flu are contagious (able to infect others) beginning one day before getting symptoms. Adults remain contagious up to seven days after getting sick and children can remain contagious for even longer. That means that you can give someone the flu before you know you're sick as well as when you are sick.

What are the symptoms of the flu versus the symptoms of a cold? In general, the flu is worse than the common cold, and symptoms such as fever, body aches, extreme tiredness and



dry cough are more common and intense. Colds tend to develop gradually, while the flu tends to start very suddenly. Preventing the Flu: Seek medical advice about getting vaccinated. Keep children home if they are having any of the above symptoms. School policy = No fever for 24 hrs. and they cannot be using any fever reducer medicine.
