



Extra! Extra! Read All About It!

- The <u>Presidential Service Award</u> program honors students who volunteer throughout their community. Students who volunteer 50, 75 or 100+ hours over the course of the school year will be honored with an award. Please contact Mrs. Doubrava in the Intermediate School office for more details.
- 2. <u>Emergency Drills</u>: Throughout the school year, we will practice several drills which include fire, shelter, bus off-site evacuation, and lockdown. They are to help us be better prepared and to ensure the safety of all in the event an emergency did happen.
- 3. NYS Law states that <u>we need a doctor's notice to dispense medication</u> even such things as over the counter medications. Students <u>may not</u> take medication on their own. Contact the school nurse with any questions.
- 4. <u>Halloween:</u> On Wednesday, October 31st, we will celebrate Halloween within the classroom late in the afternoon. There will be no parade at the Intermediate School. Students should not come to school wearing any costumes, hats or make-up. Based on team preference, students may be permitted to change into their costumes late in the day. <u>Students cannot bring any sprays or make-up</u> due to allergies. Bloody, gruesome, or violent costumes are not permitted at any time. Appropriate masks may be permitted in the classroom in the afternoon, but must be removed before riding the bus home. Safety is our primary concern. Colored hair is discouraged at all time in school. This has created a disruption to the educational process.
- 5. <u>Cars are not permitted to park in the bus and fire lanes at any time.</u> This includes after school and evening events. If you are picking up a student during the school day, please park in the large area and come to the front door. Our fire lane must be kept open.
- 6. Please encourage your child to read. The School's goal for each student is to read <u>25 books</u> a year for Grades 5 and 6. Students are recognized on the announcements as *Ferocious Readers* as they reach the goal.
- 7. **Morning Drop-off:** Students are not to arrive before <u>7:40 AM</u>. Our Cafeteria is being used by Middle School students until this time. Student arrival between 7:40 AM 8:00 AM is dependent upon good behavior.
- Dismissal: Children should be picked up promptly between 2:20 PM 2:30 PM in the Art Room. Adults picking up students will be asked to sign a dismissal sheet before leaving with students. Please park in front of the building in the upper lot and use the side doors to the Art Rooms. Please <u>do not arrive prior to</u> 2:15PM. Recess may be on the black top until 2:20 PM, and this is a safety concern.
- 9. **The Advanced Art Program begins in October.** Please see our September Newsletter or the Art Teacher's Sites at horseheadsdistrict.com for selection criteria and more information.
- 10. Four years ago we launched a Makerspace in the Intermediate School. A Makerspace is a place for students to tap their creativity and innovation by investigating/making things they are passionate about. We are starting small with things such as making challenges, electrical circuits, tech devices such as Makey Makey/Little Bits/Ozobots/Ollie/Sphero, and we even have a take apart station where students can deconstruct electrical devices to see how they work. From time to time we will be asking for general household item donations. Thank you in advance if you can help out.





The Common Core Learning Standards (CCLS) have been in our schools for many years now. The Board of Regents adopted the newly revised English Language Arts and Mathematics Learning Standards on September 11, 2017. They can be found <u>here</u>. The new standards have been the result of over two years of collaborative work to ensure New York State has the best learning standards for our students. Over 130 educators and parents worked together to make recommendations and revise the standards, resulting in a new set of revised English Language Arts and Mathematics Learning Standards. English Language Arts	Math
• Supply more non- fiction text; read non- fiction texts aloud or with your child, discuss nonfiction texts.	• Be aware of what your child struggled with last year and how that will affect learning this year.
• Supply series of texts on topics of interest, find books that are challenging at their level.	• Notice whether your child <u>REALLY</u> knows why the answer is what it is.
• Demand evidence in every day discussions/ disagreements. Read aloud or read the same book and discuss with evidence.	• Push children to know/ memorize basic math facts. Provide <u>TIME</u> for your child to work hard with math at home.
• Read often and constantly with babies, toddlers, preschoolers, and children. Read multiple books about the same topic. Let your kids see you reading. Family reading!	• Know what the priority work is for your child for their grade level, spend time with your child on priority work, ask your child's teacher about their progress on priority work.
• Encourage writing at home, write "books" together and use evidence/ details	 Ask your child to <u>DO</u> the math that comes up in your daily life
• Have your child make a claim, and back it up with evidence. <i>Ex:</i> I claim that the plants need to be watered. My evidence is that the soil is extremely dry.	• Make sure your child is <u>PRACTICING</u> the math facts he/she struggles with. Make sure your child is thinking about Math in real life

S Make sure your child has a quiet, well-lit place to do homework.

Avoid having your child do homework with the television on or in places with other distractions, such as people coming and going.

Solution Make sure the materials your child needs, such as paper, pencils and a dictionary, are available.

Ask your child if special materials will be needed for some projects and get them in advance.

O Help your child with time management.

Establish a set time each day for doing homework. Don't let your child leave homework until just before bedtime. Think about using a weekend morning or afternoon for working on big projects, especially if the project involves getting together with classmates.

Se positive about homework.

Tell your child how important school is. The attitude you express about homework will be the attitude your child acquires.

S When your child does homework, you do homework.

Show your child that the skills they are learning are related to things you do as an adult. If your child is reading, you read too. If your child is doing math, balance your checkbook.

S When your child asks for help, provide guidance, not answers.

Giving answers means your child will not learn the material. Too much help teaches your child that when the going gets rough, someone will do the work for him or her.

O When the teacher asks that you play a role in homework, do it.

Cooperate with the teacher. It shows your child that the school and home are a team. Follow the directions given by the teacher.

S If homework is meant to be done by your child alone, stay away.

Too much parent involvement can prevent homework from having some positive effects. Homework is a great way for kids to develop independent, lifelong learning skills.

Stay informed.

Talk with your child's teacher. Make sure you know the purpose of homework and what your child's class rules are.


C Help your child figure out what is hard homework and what is easy homework.

Have your child do the hard work first. This will mean he will be most alert when facing the biggest challenges. Easy material will seem to go fast when fatigue begins to set in.

S Watch your child for signs of failure and frustration.

Let your child take a short break if she is having trouble keeping her mind on an assignment. **Reward progress in homework** If your child has been successful in homework completion and is working hard, celebrate that success with a special event (e.g., pizza, a walk, a trip to the park) to reinforce the positive effort.

HABIT OF MIND AND CHARACTER TRAIT OF THE MONTH

<u>The Habit of Mind</u>: Persisting means to stick to it! Persevering in task through to completion; remaining focused. Looking for ways to reach your goal when stuck. Not giving up!

<u>Character Trait</u>: Responsibility is doing what you are expected to do, persevere, always do your best, use self-control, think before you act, be accountable for your choices/action.

Parents can help reinforce *responsibility*.

- Students can do chores at home
- Accountable for doing things in a timely manner
- Teaching time management
- Develop routines and procedures
- Encourage taking initiative

September was School Attendance Awareness Month. In cooperation with Chemung County, area school districts, including the Horseheads district, are reminding parents that good school attendance is crucial to academic success.

Research has shown that chronic absence leads to lower reading proficiency, course failure, and eventually, dropping out of school. Chronic absence is missing more than ten percent of the school year, or about 18 days. Absenteeism affects academic performance. Every day counts!

<u>WANT TO KNOW MORE ABOUT YOUR CHILD'S GRADES AND</u> <u>ATTENDANCE?...PARENT PORTAL</u>

Parents of students in grades 5-12 are able to view information about their child's attendance and grades with the "Parent Portal." In order to set up an account, we must have a valid e-mail address for each parent who would like access.

<u>Please note:</u> If you checked the Parent Portal box on your child's emergency form, or if you signed up at the school's Open House, you do not need to do anything further. You should have received further information about Parent Portal via e-mail.

If you haven't already signed up, visit the Main Office. You will be asked to complete a short form and present identification. DELAYED START PROCEDURE

The Horseheads Central School District along with other GST BOCES Districts will be using a "delayed start" procedure for inclement weather days rather than close the schools for the entire day. The delay would open each school two hours later than the normal start time. School would end at the regular time on a "delayed start" day. The media will be contacted and the decision to "delay start" will be broadcast to the public. If the decision to "delay" is later changed to "close," the media would be notified and the correction made. Once informed school is closed, the decision is final.

This means <u>transportation will arrive at the bus stop two hours later</u> as each school will open two hours later. Staff will arrive later and students being dropped off should arrive two hours later than the regular start time (9:45 AM). Lunch will be served at regular times.

PLEASE NOTE: No breakfast will be served on a "Delayed Start" Day.

NEWS FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

PLEASE READ THIS VERY IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

Dear Fifth Grade Parents/Guardians:

All 6th grade students will need to receive <u>2 doses</u> of the Varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccination along with the Tdap vaccine. The laws are very strict, and we cannot allow students to come to school after the first 10 days of school without these immunizations.

Your child may get the required immunization through your health care provider, Five Star Urgent or Walk-In Clinics or through the Chemung County Health Department, at (607)737-2028, appointment, only if qualified.

You must provide proof that your child has received the Tdap immunization in order for your child to attend school in the fall. Your health care provider or health department will provide you with this written proof once your child receives the immunization. Please bring this proof to our Health Office or fax it to us at 795-2495. **No appointment cards accepted.**

<u>Please note:</u> 10-year-old students who are entering 6th grade will not be required to receive the Tdap vaccine at this time and will not be excluded from school, but will be tracked and must be immunized upon turning 11 years old.

If you have further questions, please contact the health office at 739-6366 (Option 2). Thank you for your cooperation.



It is that time of the year again to remember good health practices. Please keep your child home if he/she has had a temperature of 100 degrees or higher, vomiting or diarrhea in the past 24 hours. Because there is no known cure for the common code, prevention is the key to keeping colds away. Most of the time you acquire a cold virus by touching your eyes, nose or mouth with an object that has the cold virus on it. Therefore, to help avoid catching a cold:

- Wash hands thoroughly and frequently with warm soapy water.
- Sneeze into a tissue, rather than your hands, then discard the tissue(*Remember to please send in tissue boxes)
- Don't touch your face—your hands may have come in contact with a cold virus!
- Drink 8 glasses of water daily.
- Get plenty of rest—up to 12 hours a night!!!

Please be considerate of others—you are contagious for the first three days that cold symptoms appear.
