







Hey, Where's My...




"Diary of a Wimpy Kid" is the first book in a series of 12, and in many people's opinions, the best. Jeff Kinney wrote it in about nine months, and it came out on April 1, 2007. So far, it has sold over 150 Million copies. It has won five awards, and been nominated for nine.

In "Diary of a Wimpy Kid", the main character, Greg Heffley, tells the story of his first year of middle school, where all he wants is to be popular. He and his best friend, Rowley Jefferson, go through a lot during the first year, get in a fight or two, and all that culminates at the end of the story. 


A Review of the Movie <u>Ratatouille</u> By Laura Satterlee and Jayce Skinner


