## **State Funding for Sing Sing Road Safety Improvement Project**

School officials credit State Senator Tom O'Mara for securing \$230,000 in state aid to assist plan for improved safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists

Horseheads Central School District officials announced that State Senator Tom O'Mara (R,C,I-Big Flats) has secured \$230,000 in this year's state budget to assist the school's plans to improve safety along County Route 17 (Sing Sing Road) in front of the Horseheads Middle and Intermediate schools.

"I'm very grateful to have this opportunity to help support this project and applaud the Horseheads Central School District for working closely with Chemung County to take the initiative and recognize this critical need for improved safety," said O'Mara, Vice Chair of the Senate Transportation Committee. "The project's completion will ease traffic congestion in the area and enhance safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists."

"We would like to thank Senator O'Mara for his assistance in securing this important funding," said Dr. Thomas J. Douglas, Horseheads superintendent of schools. "We'd also like to thank Andy Avery and Chemung County for partnering with the district to improve safety for our students, staff, residents, and motorists along Sing Sing Road. Safety is paramount, and the traffic congestion along Sing Sing Road has been a long-standing issue. We are proud to be moving forward, thanks to Senator O'Mara and Chemung County."

School officials have been working closely with Chemung County leaders to develop the plan, which calls for the addition of turning lanes, wider shoulders, and improved striping and signage. School expansions over the years have compromised the road's use capacity and caused increasing traffic delays as well as safety concerns for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists.

"This has been a safety concern for a long time so we are grateful to be able to resolve this problem and improve safety for the whole community," said Chemung County Executive, Tom Santulli. "Chemung County would like to thank Senator O'Mara for his hard work in securing aid to fund this important project."

The estimated cost of the improvement project is \$230,000 including design, construction, and inspection. Construction is expected to get underway in Spring 2018 and be completed during the summer.

The county will be the lead agency for the project and maintain the roadway in the future.

In addition to the officers, each 10<sup>th</sup> period class will elect two representatives to serve on Student Council as 10<sup>th</sup> Period Representatives. ### Middle School Halloween Dance and Open Gym Night



Each year in October, the PTO and Student Council sponsor a dance and open gym. In order to maintain a safe and enjoyable atmosphere for all of our students, we ask that the following procedures be followed:

- Dance and open gym will start at 7:00 p.m. and end promptly at 9:00 p.m. Students should make certain their transportation is waiting in the front of the school at 9:00 p.m.
- Our dance and open gym is open to students who are enrolled at Horseheads Middle School.
- To attend the dance and open gym, students must purchase a ticket during their lunch period Monday through Friday the week of the dance. No money will be collected at the door.
- All rules that apply during school hours are in effect for dances. The exception are cell phones and hats, as they are permitted. Failure to comply with school rules, may result in students being prohibited from attending other school events.
- Participants are not allowed to leave the designated areas being used for the event. Students may not leave the building until the end of the event unless a parent is present to pick them up. Once a student leaves the building, he or she will not be readmitted.
- There will be no admission after 7:30 p.m. without prior permission by an administrator.
- Refreshments are available for purchase and may not be taken outside of the designated area.
- Students who do not attend school the day of a dance and open gym will not be permitted to attend.
- Should school be cancelled the day of a dance and open gym, the event is also cancelled. It may or may not be rescheduled.
- **Please Note:** When picking up your child at the end of the dance, you will need to park in the Main Parking Lot in front of the school. Your child can wait for you to come get them or they can come find you in the parking lot.

#### **HEALTH OFFICE INFORMATION**

All **prescription medications** and **over-the-counter medications** require a medication administration order form from a physician and a parent signature. The parent or guardian must bring the medication in the original container to the health office. Students may not carry any medication (prescribed or over-thecounter) with the exception of inhalers.

The Health Office will soon begin Scoliosis screenings on all 7th and 8th graders in the PE classes.

Additionally 7th graders will be seen for their height, weight, vision and hearing, unless these results were provided on their routine physical exam. All 7th graders are required to have a Physical and Dental Certificate for 7th grade. This is a state mandate.

School appraisals/physicals will be on Oct 17 for students who do not have their own provider. We encourage parents/guardians to use their own providers since they know their child's medical history.

#### .New York State Dental Requirement

New York State now requires all schools to request dental health certificates from parents at the same time we require a health certificate (in grades K, 2, 4, 7, and 10).

#### **School Matters**

September was School Attendance Awareness Month. In cooperation with Chemung County, area school districts, including the Horseheads district, are reminding parents that good school attendance is crucial to academic success.

Research has shown that chronic absence leads to lower reading proficiency, course failure, and eventually, dropping out of school. Chronic absence is missing more than ten percent of the school year, or about 18 days. Absenteeism affects academic performance. Every day counts!



In addition to regular attendance, student success is dependent upon the support they receive at home. As students move into middle school, it becomes more and more difficult to engage students in discussions about school.
