## Volunteer makes a lasting impression on students, staff, and parents

When there's time in teachers' English Language Arts instruction schedule at Big Flats Elementary School, you can bet Barbara Dick will be in a classroom, guiding and helping her students with their writing and poetry skills, and showing them how much she cares.

"Mrs. D," as students and staff call her, has been volunteering at Big Flats, and Gardner Road before that, for the past 20 years. "I love it," she says.

Mrs. D was a first-grade teacher and school librarian for 25 years in the Campbell and Canis-

### From the superintendent

Dear Community Members,

It has been a very busy school year so far for our students, staff, and district. Our students and staff are working so hard. We have so much to be thankful for this holiday season.

There have been many wonderful events going on in our schools, from Grandparents Day at Ridge Road, to a special Veterans Tribute at Center Street, to concerts and college signings. There are too many to mention, but all are very special.

The Common Core Learning Standards and Assessments have been the subject of many discussions and news stories across the state and nation. The standards are designed to prepare our students to be college- and career-ready, and the assessments are designed to measure learning. For more information on the Common Core, visit www.engageny.org.

There are also many things going on at the district level. The state has granted the Elmira Heights Central School District \$49,500 for a consolidation study with our district. This study will explore the viability of a consolidation of the two districts. At this time, our two districts are determining the next steps. We'll share more information as it becomes available.

Additionally, in late October, a focus group of district residents, parents, staff, and business members took a close look at the various facilities/grade reconfiguration scenarios developed by consultants using data collected over the last year. The focus group ranked each scenario, and our Strategic Plan Implementation Team looked at the focus group's work at their November meeting and will be further involved in the process going forward. Our Board of Education is looking at the work and the various scenarios to determine the next steps in the process.

Why are we undertaking these studies? Like districts across the state, we have been facing financial struggles for several years due to decreasing revenues from the state. We have used reserve funds to make up for budget deficits. We have also reduced staff - 140+ positions in six years - and some programs and services. Many districts in the state are headed for educational and financial insolvency if they don't make changes. We do not want to be one of those districts.

Deficit spending cannot continue. Making more reductions and raising taxes will not make up the difference. As a result, we must take a close look at our facilities to see if we can make significant savings by using facilities in a different way, closing buildings, and/or changing the grade configuration of our schools.

These are difficult decisions in challenging times. I ask that you stay informed about the studies and the decisions being considered by the Board of Education. The Program/Facility study information is on our website at www.horseheadsdistrict.com. I also hold roundtable discussions in our community each month. The dates are on the district calendar, which is also on our website.

### New assessments: How does the Horseheads district stack up?

Our students and staff work hard to prepare for state assessments, which are designed to measure learning. As a result, our students score well compared to their counterparts in the region and state.

Last year was the first administration of the new Common Core state assessments. Below is a chart showing Horseheads students' results on these tests compared to students in the GST BOCES and in the state. A score of 3 or 4 is considered passing:

#### Business First ranks districts

*Business First* has issued its annual rankings of the 429 Upstate New York school districts. The Buffalo-area publication ranks districts in many areas.

For the second consecutive year, the Horseheads district ranks fifth in academic performance of the 40 districts in the Binghamton/Elmira area.

The district has the lowest per pupil spending of the districts in the Binghamton/Elmira area.

Additionally, the district ranks 13th out of the 429 Upstate New York districts in terms of administrative efficiency, which is based on an analysis of district spending, staffing levels, and debt service.

In the top ten percent of the rankings, the district receives a five-star designation from the magazine in the administrative efficiency category.

The district is also ranked 24th for cost-effectiveness, placing the district in the top 6% in upstate school districts.
