#### **Report Grades and Parent Teacher Conferences:**

Just a friendly reminder that report cards are only distributed in 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grades this marking period. If your child receives a '3' on the report card, that means they are currently meeting grade level expectations. A '4' would represent that your child is performing above grade level expectation. A '2' means that your child is working towards grade level expectation and a '1' represents that your child is struggling with the current grade level expectation.



## So Many Activities, So Little Time

Students who are involved in extracurricular activities—from chess club to cheerleading to chorus—tend to have higher self-esteem and stronger connections to school. But an overloaded schedule with too many activities can have the opposite effect, leaving your child—and you!—stressed. Keep these tips in mind for managing your child's activity load.

#### Aim for 3 activities.

Though every child is different, psychologists often suggest involving a child in no more than three activities at a time: one social activity (like Boys' Club or a church group); one physical activity (like gymnastics, swimming,

or basketball); and one artistic activity, such as an art class or music lessons.

#### Limit involvement.

To avoid burnout, keep involvement in any one activity to just a day or two a week, unless your child absolutely begs for more. Check with them periodically to make sure they are still eager to attend; if not, scale back.

#### Broaden their horizons.

Although following your child's interests is important, introduce your child to something new, whether it's a new sport, a musical instrument, or a group like Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts.

The secret to keeping enthusiasm high is to start slowly and gauge your child's interest before committing beyond the first few sessions.

#### Be supportive, not critical.

No matter what your child is interested in, remember that your job as a parent is to be supportive. The point of activities is to expand your child's interests and abilities, not to transform him or her into a child prodigy or the next sports superstar.

#### Schedule downtime.

Children need time to ponder, explore, and play—but an overloaded schedule prevents that. Make sure that when the day is over and the homework is done, there's still time for your child to be a kid.

#### Change it up.

Specializing in one activity—
especially a sport—at a very
young age can be harmful.
Pediatricians discourage the kind
of repetitive movements that
come from concentrated effort in
one sport. Plus, kids who dedicate
themselves to a single sport early
can burn out later and may regret
not trying other sports.

#### Watch for signs of stress.


The stress of trying to keep up with too many planned activities can take a physical toll on your child. Watch for signs of stress,

including stomachaches and headaches, difficulty paying attention, a drop-off in interest in activities he or she used to enjoy, and increased "clinginess" with a parent or other close adult (e.g., teacher, babysitter). If you notice any of these signs, chances are your child needs to cut back on activities and destress.

#### Decompress at home.

Make sure there's room in your schedule for family time. Children need to have meals with their parents, hear bedtime stories, share chores, and play games. Extra-curricular activities can help children learn and grow, but remember that what your child needs first and foremost is to feel special and loved.




#### FROM THE MIDDLEBROOK FILES

At the June 2019 ISTE (International Society for Technology in Education) Conference in Philadelphia, Digital Citizenship was a key theme.



Being a digital citizen is one of the ISTE Standards, which states that "students recognize the rights, responsibilities, and opportunities of living, learning, and working in an interconnected digital world, and they act and model in ways that are safe, legal, and ethical." Highlights of the conference as well as linked resources are included below.



Digital Citizenship gurus Dr. Mike Ribble and Dr. Marty Park presented their new book The **Digital Citizenship Handbook for School Leaders**. Part of their work includes the S3 Framework, which states that today's students must be Safe, Savvy, and Social. (the 3 S's)

Using that framework, they have

created a powerful Digital Citizenship 9 Elements Progression Chart that schools can utilize to teach digital citizenship K-12. Additionally, they shared many resources for teachers to use in their classrooms, including Digital Compass and Technology Driver's License Activities, parent information, using the BrainPOP digital citizenship materials, and much more. You can follow Mike Ribble on Twitter @digcitizen.

Another session presented by **Brandi Miller** looked at Districtwide Digital Citizenship: Implementation Ideas for Growing Strong Digital Leaders. The district created a website and curated material from Common Sense Education by grade level. Teachers were expected to do a minimum of 3 lessons and collect artifacts and share them. After the initial year, they are planning to grow their digital citizenship implementation in year 2 and beyond.



## WATKINS GLEN CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Teachers Integrate Digital Citizenship with other Technology Skills

We have been working with the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grades students on ways to be safe on the Internet while we learn to use some of the features of Word and Publisher.

Here are some the projects we are doing:

- We had a discussion about cyber footprints. Then we typed a list of things we should do to stay safe on the Internet in Word.
- We found an image of a footprint and placed it in Publisher. Then they filled it with pictures to represent how we stay safe on the Internet. The students hung them in the halls.
- We chose one item from our "footprint" to create a single message poster in Publisher. (ex. use a strong password, or report cyberbullying). These were also hung in the halls.
- We discussed and made a table in Word of URL extensions to help us recognize the sources of our information.
- We discussed and looked at fake websites then made a table of criteria for evaluating websites.

All students in GST BOCES Component School Districts are invited to participate for a chance to have their work published in a Digital Citizenship Calendar. Entries should feature original artwork illustrating safe use of the Internet and/or mobile devices.

#### **Guidelines, Rules, and Requirements**

- Only original hand-drawn or electronically created submissions will be accepted.
- This year the subject of the art should include some form of a title, statement, or slogan about Online Safety.
- Any text should be dark and large enough to be read easily.
- Submissions may be in the format of either a full-page drawing or a 4-panel comic.

#### **Layout and Dimensions**

• The art should be created in a landscape (horizontal) orientation (and easily scalable to 11" x 8.5") as the calendars will be printed and distributed in an 11" x 8.5" landscape format.

#### **Additional Requirements**

- Artwork may not contain trademarked images or brands such as Disney Characters, or company logos.
- Artwork may not have identifying information (such as the student's name or age) on the front of the
  poster. If there is identifying information on the back of the art it should not bleed through to the
  front of the poster.
- Adults may offer minimum technical support but cannot aid in the creative process.
- Inappropriate or offensive language and/or images will cause a submission to be disqualified.
- All art files must be submitted in an electronic format via email and cannot be larger than 8MB.
   The art may be wholly created in a software program or it may be created on paper and scanned to a digital file.

When the entry form is completed, the form and the electronic art file should be attached to an email message and sent to: **dc@gstboces.org** with **Calendar Art Contest** in the subject line.

Entries must be received by BOCES by the end of the day on Friday, February 28, 2020.

Important Notice: All submitted art file entries become the property of GST BOCES and may be used in the calendar or in future publications. Entries will not be returned.
