Extra! Extra! Read All About It!

1. It is that time of the year again to replenish your child's school supplies such as pencils and paper. Some items available include pencils, pens, mechanical pencils, highlighters, glue sticks and notebook paper.

2. This is the time of year when we advertise and promote our annual STEM night for students. Normally we have dozens of interactive displays, presentations, and demonstrations for students to explore. Unfortunately, with the current health guidelines, we will need to cancel this event.

- 3. The 6th Grade Celebration is a time for our 6th grade to students to come together as an entire grade level for fun activities at the end of the year. Currently it is scheduled for Wednesday, June 23rd. However, we are not sure what that might look like at this time. More information will be coming out once we have further guidance.
- 4. Afternoon Pick-Up: Afternoon recess ends at 2:10 PM for many classes. Our upper parking lot is used during recess for basketball and other games. This is especially important with snow and mud. Parents should not arrive before 2:10 PM to pick up students for dismissal. If you arrive early, please park in the row farthest away from the basketball hoops facing the Main Parking Lot.
- 5. We encourage students to bring sneakers to school every day. Sneakers are required for Physical Education class. Boots and dress shoes are not appropriate for Physical Education classes. Additionally, appropriate clothing should be worn for outdoor recess.


PLACEMENT INFORMATION FOR SIXTH GRADE

2021-2022 Budget Development

The Board of Education and District are currently developing the Proposed 2021-2022 School Budget. The global pandemic, now nearing a year, has led to a challenging time for budgets in our district, nation, state and homes. The Board will continue Budget Development at their next several meetings until the final adoption of the Budget to be offered to voters on May 18th. All meetings begin at 6:00 PM and are held via zoom with live streaming. Here is the schedule:

NYS ELA and Math Tests

The ELA State Test will be given on April 22nd and April 23rd. The Math State Test will be given on May 6th and May 7th. These tests help us determine how each student is performing with specific skills in both ELA and Math toward the standards' expectations. It is just one data point we consider when making important decisions. They also help us to know who needs extra help (Academic Intervention Services or AIS) for the following school year in each of these areas. **Please note that a refusal of the State Tests does not mean students will be exempt from AIS if they qualify.**

The State Tests this year will be taken electronically in grades 5th – 8th. We will continue to give students practice on the computer with the questions they will see. One of our challenges is helping students to be fluent in their typing ability. If you'd like to encourage your child to practice, Typing.com is a great program for that!

*We explain to students that the tests are important and to try their best. However, we don't want to burden our students with stress and anxiety. Thanks for your help with this!

Test Taking Tips For Parents

- 1. Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep before a test and has a nutritious breakfast in the morning.
- 2. Maintain a pleasant home environment and avoid unnecessary conflicts. Try to make the morning of the test a pleasant one.
- 3. Make sure your child has taken any needed medication.
- 4. Ensure that your child is present during testing (children generally perform better when taking tests with their class, rather than at a make-up time).
- 5. Get your child to school on time the day of the test.
- 6. Wish your child good luck each morning of the test. Tell your child that you believe in him/her.
- 7. Remind your child the test is important, but don't put too much emphasis on them that would create stress or anxiety.
- 8. Encourage him/her to do their best.
- 9. Remind your child to listen carefully to the instructions from the teacher, and to read the directions and each question carefully.
- 10. Explain to your child the importance of using time wisely. If your child gets stuck on a question, encourage him or her to make the best guess and move on.
- 11. Tell your child to attempt to answer all of the questions and not to leave any blank.
- 12. Encourage your child to stay focused on the test, even if other students finish early.

Clearly going to school regularly matters!

We don't want your child to fall behind in school and become discouraged. Please ensure that your child attends school every day and arrives on time. Here are a few practical tips to help support regular attendance:

- Make sure your child keeps a regular bedtime and establish a morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Ensure your child goes to school every day unless they are truly sick (i.e. stomach bug or fever)
- Avoid scheduling vacations or doctor's appointments when school is in session.
- Talk to teachers and counselors for advice if your child feels anxious about going to school.
- Develop back up plans for arriving to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, neighbor, or friend to take your child to school.

As an added incentive, the Intermediate School typically encourages students to come to school as they "Pop Toward Super Attendance." Classes work toward spelling "We Are Super Awesome Innovators" to earn a popcorn party for achieving up to 97% class attendance. Students are also recognized for their individual efforts of attending school with pencil and bag of popcorn each marking period for achieving the 97% mark. We hope to resume this program at the end of the pandemic.

Please let us know how we can best support you and your child so that he/she can show up for school on time every day. If you are struggling in any way to get your child to school, please contact us so we can work together to solve the problem. We want your child to be successful in school!



18 OR MORE DAYS

- Excused and unexcused absences represent lost time in the classroom and lost opportunities to learn.
- Missing just one day every two weeks can add up to 18 days in a year. Absences add up before you even know it.



10 TO 17 DAYS

- Students who are absent an average of 15 days a year miss a year's worth of school before their senior year.
- When students miss a day of school it actually puts them two days behind their classmates.



9 OR FEWER ABSENCES

- Students with good attendance generally achieve higher grades and enjoy school more.
- Children benefit and make the most of their educational opportunities if they attend school regularly and on time.



NEWS FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE PLEASE READ THIS VERY IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

Dear 5th Grade Parents/Guardians:

In order to be in compliance with NYS immunization requirements, all 6th grade students* must receive a booster dose of the Tdap immunization. The Tdap immunization is a tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis immunization. It is a tetanus booster that also adds protection for pertussis (whooping cough). This vaccine is not a new vaccine and has been required for school attendance since September 1, 2016.

To meet the requirement, this Tdap vaccine must be given no earlier than 10 years of age and no later than 11 years of age. For 6th grade students who are 11 years old, proof of this vaccine must be received withing 14 calendar days of the start of school. Information must be received by September 21, 2021 or your child will be unable to attend school starting on September 22, 2021, until paperwork has been brough in with the documented Tdap being given. You must provide proof that your child has received the Tdap immunization for your child to attend school in the fall. Acceptable forms of documentation include an Immunization certificate signed or stamped by your health care provider or an electronic health record copy from your health care provider's office. You may email this to rtorgalski@horseheadsdistrict.com, fax to our office at 607-795-2495 or drop it off to the Intermediate School.

Your child may receive the required immunization through your health care provider or through the Chemung County Health Department. For more information, please call (607) 737-2028 #2 for an appointment.

NYS Department of Health effective September 2, 2016 requires all 7th and 12th grade students have a meningococcal vaccine.

*Please note: 10 year old students who are entering 6th grade will not be required to receive this vaccine at this time. They must receive this vaccine no later than 14 days after turning 11 years old and will be tracked accordingly.

Character Trait: Respect


- Having Respect for someone means you think good things about who a person is or how he/she acts. You can have respect for others, and you can have respect for yourself.
